Pet Poison Prevention

What you don't know could hurt your dog

In 2017 and in just the United States, there were 199,000 reported cases of potential pet poisonings, according to the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Poison Control Center (APCC). This was an increase from the previous 180,000 the prior

So what were the #1 & #2 pet toxins that year? Human medications; both prescription and over-the-counter (OTC).

Common items found in every home!

That's why every year during the 3rd full week of March, the focus is put on proactively preventing accidental pet poisonings.

Just like you wouldn't leave anything potentially dangerous or toxic within reach of your infant or toddler, it's just as important when it comes to your curious canines. 
Remember: Size does matter

If you have small dogs or puppies in your home, remember they are even MORE susceptible to toxins in smaller quantities - and in less time - with more severe and potentially life-threatening results.

(This doesn't mean the larger and giant dogs are any safer though!)

Know the facts and keep your dog (other pets and children) safe!

- » Marijuana contains THC (a natural, mind-altering ingredient). It should always be kept out of reach of children and pets.
- Hemp does NOT contain THC. Hemp contains high levels of toxic-free CBD (an active medicinal compound).
